
The Prep work's been done!

A Piece of History

Contributed by Linden Armstrong (Rush) Below are two excerpts from the Rutland Story, written by Bert (FH) Rutland about 1954 when he was 80 vears old.

"Willie Mason was the son of Tom Mason of Ruapeka Pa. Tom's father was the Chief who put the finishing touches on the big canoe in his declining years after Tom had paddled it down on the top of a high flood from Dalton's farm. The large Totara was sold to the Maoris in the year of 1869 for quite a few shillings. The canoe was to be built for the Ruapeka Chief and a whole lot of maoris camped up at Daltons where the canoe was being built. Peter Hemi's youngest son was 3 years at the time. When the canoe got to the stage that the finishing touches had to done elsewhere. Mr Gwillam of Havelock borrowed Mr James Twidle's bullocks and hauled the canoe out of the bush to near the river where it was tied up to wait for a flood. When the flood did come Tom walked three and a half miles up the river, swam across and paddled the canoe single-handed back to the Pa where the old chief finished it off."

"The elder boys of the (Wilson) family saw the making of the large canoe (that now lies in the Christchurch Museum) by the hands of the Kerepa Chief of Ruapeka, in the year 1869-70. These boys said Kerepa had only a shirt on while he chopped away with a sharp adze, it being hard work in his declining days. He was the great-grandfather of the Masons who live around Marlborough. Kerepa died when the canoe was in shape, but the side boards he did not get on. He handed the canoe down to his son Meihana. later known as Tom Mason who in the year 1879 sold the canoe to the Rutland Bros. for the sum of Twelve Pounds to be used to carry chaff to Kaiuma for the Brownlee bullocks."
