MARLBOROUGH DISTRICT COUNCIL SPEED LIMIT REVIEW

The review of local roads speed limits closes this Friday the 27th of

September and this is a reminder to get online and have your say on what the speed limit should be on your roads.

Several residents on Wakamarina Road have had animals run over or hit by speeding vehicles, kids on horses scared by fast

vehicles, close or near misses when pulling into or out of the driveway onto the roadway...... no doubt there are numerous other examples that you are aware of.

With the increasing numbers of residents and the correspondingly larger numbers of vehicles, also those visitors we will be seeing up and down the roads as the tourism season approaches then we need to have to address the question,..."is our road suitable for a 100km per hour speed limit?"if not then should it be reduced to say 80 or 70 km/hr??......should the entrance to Canvastown passed the playground, the hall, toilet block, the shop and the Trout Hotel remain at 100km/hr as it is presently!! ??

Mental Health – MPHO have put out a guide on what to do if you are worried about your, or your loved ones, mental health. The full guide can be found on the PAHT website. Patient Portal – Springlands Medical Centre (and therefore Havelock Medical Centre) has signed up to the national patient portal system- Health 365. You can now manage your health online. With this service you can:

- *Make appointments with your GP or nurse
- *Order repeat prescriptions
- *Access your medical records
- *Track your lab/test results
- *Access the consultation notes your doctor makes
- *Get a list of scheduled events, e.g. due dates for check-ups, follow up care etc

To sign up, grab an enrolment form from Havelock Medical Centre or the Havelock Charity Shop. Fill it in and bring it to the medical centre. Note: If you only have one email address for a couple, you will need to sign confidentiality agreements. It is better to have separate email addresses.



Shingles Vaccine – Enquire about the <u>free</u> shingles vaccine for over 65 year-olds. People with compromised conditions should also enquire.

Celebrations

"I came to Wakamarina in 1960 when my parents Bill and Shirley Douglas bought Great Uncle Les Douglas's farm at Fullers Creek, I was eight years old, with my brother Leslie, sister Lynnette and Jenny was born in the Valley.

There was no power for nearly 2 years, we used candles and a lamp. The toilet was out under the Pear tree, even when we had the septic tank put in we still had to step out onto the veranda to go to the toilet. The bathroom was primitive, no wash basin. The wash house had no ceiling, looked straight into cobwebs. We had an open fire in the sitting room.

One thing we did have was freedom to roam around the farm, up and down the creeks, eeling, swimming and going down to the banks of the Wakamarina River. Up and down the hills always bare foot. No stranger danger. No road rules, second hand bikes. We had possum hunting, goat hunting, deer stalking, cricket and tennis.

We had a big vegetable garden, house cow, chooks, own mutton and firewood for the wood and coal range, Mother sewed our clothes. Grocery and meat were delivered by Hebberds, Orsmans and Hortons. Mail from the Post Office by the Hall.

Four generations have gone to Canvastown School, Bill Douglas, Leslie, Sheryl, Lynnette and Jenny, Leslie's daughter Connie. My children Kirsty, Michelle and Matthew. Michelle's boys Nathan and Ryan. Rosemary taught three generations of them. We had picnics at Momarangi and Onamalutu. Sports days at Rai Valley, Linkwater, Okaramio and Havelock."
